Through symbolic gestural vocabulary and cultural motifs, the work creates an aesthetic tableau that resonates with profound melancholy. The choreography interweaves symbolic movement with cultural elements, inviting diverse interpretations that transcend religious connotations to speak to our contemporary globalized world through a transcultural lens. This work has garnered international recognition through presentations at prestigious venues worldwide, including the World Congress on Dance Research (Athens, Greece), Seoul International Dance Festival (Seoul, South Korea), Landes Theater (Coburg, Germany), American Dance Guild Festival at the Ailey Citigroup Theater (New York City), Palm Desert Choreography Festival at McCallum Theatre (Palm Desert, California), Washington International Dance Festival at Atlas Performing Arts Center (Washington, D.C.), and Detroit Dance City Festival at the Detroit Institute of Arts (Detroit, Michigan).
